

SALTASH NEIGHBOURHOOD DEVELOPMENT PLAN

EQUALITY IMPACT ASSESSMENT MAY 2020

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1. Introduction

1.1 The Equality Act 2010 (the Act) places a duty on all public authorities in the exercise of their functions to have regard to the need to eliminate discrimination, to advance equality of opportunity, and to foster good relations between persons with a "protected characteristic" and those without.

1.2 Equality Impact Assessment

Equality Impact Assessment (EqIA) is the systematic analysis of a policy or policies, primarily to identify the potential for an adverse impact on a particular group or community, in particular those with a protected characteristic. It is a method of assessing and recording the likely differential and/or adverse impact of a policy on people from different groups, so that if a policy results in unfairness or discrimination then changes to eliminate or lessen the impact can be considered.

1.3 The 'Protected characteristics' that are defined in the Act. For NDPs the relevant 'Protected characteristics' are age, disability, gender reassignment, pregnancy and maternity, marriage and civil partnership, race, religion or belief, sex, and sexual orientation. In Cornwall, we also have a category of Cornish Status. This document considers the impact of the policies in the Saltash Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP) to ensure that these groups are not being discriminated or disadvantaged by them. The focus is mainly on 'indirect discrimination' which can occur when a policy applies to everyone but disadvantages a person with a particular protected characteristic.

1.4 Aims of the EqIA

The underlying purpose of the EqIA is to increase participation and inclusion, to change the culture of public decision making and to nurture a more proactive approach to the promotion of equality and fairness at the heart of public policy. The aim in conducting the EqIA is the promotion of fairness and equality of opportunity and thus it is the outcomes that are of primary concern. The EqIA assesses the impact of the proposed Policies on groups with protected characteristics.

2. Methodology

- 2.1 An assessment has been made as to whether the Saltash NDP is expected to have a positive, negative, or neutral impact on each of the protected characteristics. A brief exposition of the Policies and notes on any mitigation has been provided.
- 2.2 The impact of the Policies has been assessed taking into account the baseline information about the population of Saltash Parish. If the impact is negative, this has been given a high, medium or low assessment. The impact of the Policies has been based on the current situation (i.e. disregarding any actions planned to be carried out in future).
 - High impact a significant potential impact, risk of exposure, history of complaints, no mitigating measures in place etc.
 - Medium impact some potential impact exists, some mitigating measures are in place, poor evidence.
 - Low impact almost no relevancy to the process, e.g. an area that is very much legislation-led.

Where there is a potential positive impact, in that the outcome of the policies will be likely to be of benefit to the interest of groups with protected characteristics, this is also indicated.

2.3 Where there is a negative impact, any necessary mitigation is identified.

3. Summary Data

3.1 The paragraphs below use census data to give a picture of the current demographic profile of Saltash. Data is not readily available for all protected characteristics at a local level. Where it is difficult to give a statistical basis for a group, we have used the best data known from reliable sources that represent the interest of a people falling within a protected characteristic. Unless stated otherwise, the data source is from the 2011 Census and mid-year estimates reported by the Office for National statistics (ONS).

The age profile of the resident population of Saltash Parish has changed significantly over the period 2002 to 2018. Whilst the Parish population grew 12.6%, the proportion of that population that was over retirement age grew by 60.5%, the number of working age grew by only 3.45% and the number of young people remained static (0.31%). In 2018 people of 65 or over made up 23.7% of the population, compared to 16.6% in 2002. This was well beyond the comparable figure for Cornwall and elsewhere (See Table 1 below).

Looking more closely at the detail below these broad figures, it can be seen that the change is not simply a matter of a static/declining population growing older and living longer but also involves significant losses of younger working age population and large increases in older age groups. 30.3% of the parish population was in the 25-44 age range, in 2002, but this fell to 25.2% by 2018. The number with 'rising careers' in the 30 to 44 range fell from 21.5% to 16.0%. Notably there is also a

decline in the school age population coming through, from 20.3% to 17.3%. This suggests a scenario where younger people are leaving the Parish to find better work and housing, whilst older (and probably better-off) people replace them. It implies that the new housing planned for in the Cornwall Council Site Allocations DPD may more likely be occupied by older people. The latter form a 'toppling wave' of older people in the Parish moving forward into infirmity. Source: Nomis Table KS002 (Census 2001), KS102 EW (Census 2011), Mid-Year Estimates 2002-2018

Gender Reassignment and Sexual Orientation

No census data on sexual orientation and gender preference is available. The ONS Integrated Household Survey 2011 found 1.9% to be lesbian, gay or bisexual. However, Stonewall says that the UK Government estimate, used for policy making, that around 5% to 7% of the population is lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender or questioning (LGBTQ), is reasonable. This implies that between 950 and 1300 of the usually resident population may describe themselves as LGBTQ.

Other Data

- 19% of people have no qualification compared to 22% across England
- 14% of children live in poverty compared to 19% across England
- 74.6% of dwellings are owner occupied compared to 64.1% across England
- 8.9% of people live in health deprivation hotspots compared to 19.8% across England
- Working age population is 10,125, or 60.4% compared to 63.5% in England

- 5% of 16—24 age group on workless benefits compared to 4.3% in SW
- 5.7% receive Disability Living Allowance compared to
 4.7% in England
- 24.7% of people live in environmental deprivation compared to 20.9% in England
- 11.7 % provide unpaid help compared to 10.3% across England

- 25.3% in admin and skilled trades compared to 22.9% across England
- 10.3% in caring and leisure, compared to 9.3% across England
- 9.7% in elementary occupations compared to 11.1% across England
- I,080 crimes between Jan/Dec 2017, of which 30.3% were anti-social behaviour
- 39% in managerial and professional work, compared to 41.2% across England

3.2 In summary, Saltash has:

- an ageing population with about 24% over 65
- a declining population of younger people
- A much higher proportion of white people than the national average, and fewer people of the black and multi-ethnic community
- A religious structure similar to the SW but with fewer minority beliefs than nationally
- A slightly higher proportion of people with limiting long term illness than the national average
- As many as 1300 people who are LGBTQ
- A slight preponderance of females over males in the population
- A notably greater proportion of married and civil partnership couples than in Cornwall and England, and more divorced people, and a smaller share of single people.
- A lower proportion of lone parent households than typical.

4. Community Engagement Strategy

4.1 In setting up the Engagement and Consultation Strategy (HYPERLINK HERE) the Stakeholder Group considered the nature and demographics of the Town (as above), noting that some small communities could be hidden in the largely homogenous wider community, and prepared methods that took account of the diversity of the whole community, so all members of the community inform the plan. The team worked hard to design engagement activities that were as fully inclusive as possible, such as displays at key community locations with good venue accessibility for everyone, timings that suited those in work, or with families at home, and a variety of communication methods to reach as wide an audience as possible, including a dedicated interactive website with options to change viewing settings, Facebook and Twitter social media, local press, posters, flyers, and banners, and door-to-door summary leaflets, letters to organisations representing for example LGBGT+ group, the Polish and South Asian communities.

5. The Plan Vision and its Impact

5.1 A vision for Saltash for 2030 was developed through community engagement:

'Saltash will be an envied riverside town, being greener, more inclusive and prosperous in all aspects, with a reinvigorated Town Centre and Waterfront, award-winning new housing, a diverse economy, with an excellent quality of life and lifestyle for all ages'

5.2 It is considered that the vision is inclusive of all those falling within one of the protected characteristics, and the assessment is that that they will gain an overall positive impact.

6. The Plan Objectives and their Impact

- 6.1 The Objectives of the Saltash Parish NDP are as follows:
 - Secure a diverse and prosperous Local Economy
 - Regenerate the Town Centre, especially Fore Street, and Manage the Growth of "Out of Town" shopping
 - Create and Support Sustainable Neighbourhoods
 - Revitalise the Waterfront
 - Ensure a Balanced Range of Quality New Housing
 - Protect and Enhance the Built Environment
 - Enhance the Natural Environment of the Parish
 - Manage the Rural Areas of the Parish in a Sympathetic Manner
 - Meet the Changing demand for Health, Education, and
 - Community Services and Facilities
 - Meet the growing demand for additional Sport, Recreation and Leisure facilities
 - Encourage Improved and Sustainable Connectivity
 - Tackle the causes and impacts of climate change

6.2 These objectives are very broad in their phrasing and can be considered to be inclusive. Any negative impacts are addressed in the policies that follow from the objectives.

7. Summary of Policies and their Impact
